Leadership, Obscurity, and a Kid with a Blanket

The opinions and involvement of the Medical Society really mean a lot to our local community. This point was brought out by C. K.

Rust at a recent Executive Committee meeting. Dr. Rust relayed his experiences with other community leaders that highlight the high regard afforded the Medical Society's positions and attention to various matters. Whether we might mistakenly underestimate the impact of this Society or not, its de facto leadership role remains and is powerful. Perhaps we are at our best when we lead in spite of ourselves, a principle we might have learned as children watching cartoons.

I'm a kid at heart when it comes to enjoying classic Christmas specials, and A Charlie Brown Christmas is a chief example. The Vince Guaraldi soundtrack is a personal favorite. In this brief animated gem, which first aired in 1965, I can still often find something to appreciate more deeply year after year. Remember when the depressed Charlie Brown goes to Lucy for psychiatric counseling? Her sign reads The Doctor



is "Real In," and her office is merely an adapted lemonade stand. Do physicians at times have overblown opinions of themselves? And what of our balancing act between the business of medicine and the compassionate practice of its art? The look on Charlie Brown's face, as he represents a patient, is telling at

the end of this exchange: Lucy: "May I help you?" CB: "I am a mess." Lucy: "Wait a minute. Before you begin, I must ask that you pay in advance. 5 cents please. Boy! What a sound! How I love to hear that old money clink!"

I especially appreciate the lesson of Charlie Brown as leader. The prototypic alter ego for us all in our humanity, his experience as a leader is especially relevant. His position as director of the Christmas play is one of dubious importance, a position that no one really wanted. When he applies himself to the task with vigor and purpose, we find the entire Peanuts cast immersed in the revelry of dancing to Schroeder playing Linus and Lucy. With increased effort and dedication, Charlie Brown scores diminishing success and respect. "He's not the kind that you can depend on to do anything right...You're hopeless, Charlie Brown, completely hopeless...You've been dumb before, Charlie Brown, but this time you really did it." Have you ever heard this from those you would seek to lead? Even worse, this is the way we often talk to ourselves when successes aren't forthcoming. At this point, sometimes all one can do is say "Rats!" and look for an answer outside ourselves.

A specific principle has often intrigued me, but especially when I consider the Christmas holiday. It is the concept of a quiet truth, a subtle yet all important detail, an undetected secret agent whose action determines the entire outcome of events, or an unseen element that despite its obscurity is central, even paramount. Nowhere is this more strikingly illustrated than in the concept of the silent night of the Nativity. The One Christians believe to be God Himself and the Savior of all mankind entered the world in the anonymity of a lowly birth in a stable. This is the story that Linus, (whose name means Christian companion) so simply relates as he quotes from the Gospel of Luke. Amidst holiday lights, jazz music, dancing, a "Christmas Queen," a beagle

gone commercial, and a kid playing Beethoven on a Steinway sounding toy piano, Charlie Brown's inspiration comes from timeless truth, proclaimed by a kid holding a blanket.

With a renewed sense of purpose, Charlie Brown presses on to decorate his sparsely needled, diminutive tree. The once mutinous Peanuts, sobered by Linus' message and Charlie Brown's hopeful response, follow him unanimously and voluntarily. Still, the weight of a single ornament bends the tree to the ground eliciting his final exasperation and self-deprecation: "Everything I touch gets ruined." Yet as from ashes to beauty, the Peanuts gang thus inspired magically transforms the tree to a decorated beauty with just "a little love." Still, for the leader, even after such final success based on openness to principle and truth, one cannot expect unqualified accolades: "Charlie Brown is a block head, but he did get a nice tree."

Though timeless values that might ideally drive modern medicine may be increasingly obscured in the days ahead, perhaps our greatest calling is to heighten our awareness to principle, listen, and respond. When others follow, so will our successes.

When I agreed to edit this edition of The Bulletin, I initially said I would try to avoid platitudes in an article. "Oh, be platitudinous" was the response I received. My work here is done. Rats!

Mr. X, a 47-year old male, comes to the New Hanover County Health Department with his son, a healthy 16-year old who wants to play football at Hoggard High School. His son needs a sports physical exam. Mr. X, a structural engineer, was downsized from his company and is actively seeking employment. He and his family have no health insurance. Ms. Y is a 50-year old female. She has worked for the last 20 years in environmental services for a company, has not missed any days of work, and cannot afford health insurance offered by her company for her family. Mr. Z is a 28-year old graphic artist. He considers himself lucky to have found a job but his small company does not offer health insurance.

Recognize these people? The list goes on and on. We have all seen those who have lost their insurance, never had insurance, or cannot afford it on their salary. Some of them may be our family members or employees. The current economic climate has increased the numbers of uninsured people everywhere, and New Hanover and Pender counties are not different.

Cape Fear HealthNet (CFHN) was incorporated in 2008 as a 501c3 non-profit organization to improve the way care is delivered to those who are poor and without insurance. The Board of Directors includes members from a wide range of health and social service agencies in New Hanover and Brunswick counties as well as practicing and retired physicians. Our own physicians, Drs. CK Rust, Jim Snyder, Ken White, Jim Jones, Ted Winneberger, Jim Hundley, and Lee Whitehurst, donate their time and service on this board.

Cape Fear HealthNet (CFHN) Janelle A. Rhyne, M.D.

Our goals are as follows:

- Expand the safety net to provide medical homes for primary care
- Create a centralized system
 that standardizes eligibility,
 redistributes patients throughout the safety net based on
 acuity and capacity, and refers
 them for specialty and primary
 care
- Provide case management of patients with chronic disease, teaching them to manage their symptoms and avoid unnecessary medical care
- Create a network of volunteer physicians for referrals from the safety net
- Create a network of pharmacy solutions to ensure patients can afford medication

The 14 participating agencies include Access III of the Lower Cape Fear, Brunswick Community Hospital, Brunswick County Health Department, Cape Fear Community College-Dental Hygiene Program, New Hope Clinic, Coastal Family Medicine, Good Shepherd Center, Little River Medical Center, NHRMC Outpatient Clinics, New Hanover Community Health Center, New Hanover County Health Department, Saint Mary Dental Clinic and Health Center, Tileston Clinic, and Wilmington Health Access for Teens (WHAT). We are in the process of expanding to Pender and Columbus counties to better serve our existing patients from those counties.

CFHN services include: referrals for primary care, specialty care and other medical services; education from the nurse advocate; medication assistance; and oral health education. Specifically

the nurse advocates help our patients better manage their health by helping them manage chronic diseases such as asthma, diabetes, COPD, and heart disease; understand their physician's plan of care; obtain medicines and teach them how to take their medications; obtain medical devices and learn how to use them; understand diet and exercise needs; find help with community resources for food, dental care, support groups, classes, and other needs.

Our dream is to build a coordinated system of care among all of our providers. How can you help? We have looked at the models of other county medical societies including Wake, Moore, and Buncombe counties. We have tried to incorporate their best practices. We need specialists and primary care volunteer physicians.

Currently our clinics are at capacity but we are now adding capacity. We are working with Saint Mary Health Center who has opened a new medical clinic, the Episodic Care Clinic, and with Tileston and WHAT to increase their physician coverage at their clinics. I am providing clinical care at Saint Mary Health Center, Tileston, and WHAT along with our generous volunteer physicians. I also will be calling you for assistance. Some orthopedists, gastroenterologists, and primary care physicians have graciously agreed to join our group of volunteer physicians and take referrals. We hope that other physicians will follow their example. CFHN will assist physicians in our network with the management and education of the patients. I look forward to speaking with you about more specific information about our program.

On-site EHR Assistance for Your Practice Mark D. Darrow, MD, FACP

While the federal government continues to finalize the meaningful use requirements for electronic health records (EHR), many providers are left with more questions than answers regarding Health Information Technology (HIT). What we DO know so far is that at some point fairly soon the electronic reporting of health care data will be mandated and warehoused in some fashion. The initial focus of the federal effort is Primary Care practices.

It is clear that eligible providers can earn up to \$44,000 or more in federal incentives by properly implementing and demonstrating "meaningful use" of a certified EHR. What is not clear are the steps practices must take to ensure that providers actually achieve "meaningful use". For many small to mid-size practices, this task is overwhelming and will almost certainly require the help of an external consultant(s).

In our region, on-site EHR assistance for qualified practices is available at NO additional cost. The funds to support this program are currently supplied through a federal Regional Extension Center (REC) grant awarded to the North Carolina Area Health Education Centers Program (NC AHEC). Locally, the South East Area Health Education Center (SEAHEC)

has put together a team of highly qualified consultants with EHR expertise to guide you through all steps of EHR preparation, selection, and implementation. SEAHEC's consultants assist practices with paper based charting and practices that currently have EHR. SEAHEC's team can help you:

> Prepare for an EHR by assessing your current office workflows Evaluate and select a certified EHR the appropriate federal incentives program (Medicare \$44 K per provider, Medicaid \$63 K per provider)

Set realistic expectations for your providers, nursing staff, front office staff, and patients

Create user friendly templates in your EHR

Establish quality reporting and improve clinical outcomes

SEAHEC's team of consultants is comprised of professionals with practice management expertise, technical proficiency, and quality improvement expertise. All consultants attended detailed training classes and are working collaboratively at the state level with all nine AHEC regions.

SEAHEC's services include financial

assessments, hardware assessments, interface building, guidance in template building, evaluation of e-prescribing, patient centered medical home recognition, and implementation of guideline based protocols for care delivery. At this time, SEAHEC is working with 114 providers in Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, New Hanover, Onslow and Pender counties.

To apply for services, visit the SEA-Analyze your current data to choose HEC website at www.seahec.net and click on the Apply for Regional Extension Center Services button. Providers should apply for this service as soon as possible while there is no charge and while space is available. To speak with a member of SEAHEC's consulting team, call 910.667.9215.

> Achieving meaningful use does not have to be difficult or costly. Let the SEAHEC consulting team assist your practice so that you may begin receiving incentive payments in 2011.

"... I am three rotations into my 3rd year of medical school at Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine. Right now I am in Danville, PA at Geisinger Medical Center doing my pediatrics rotation. I also took the Naval Health Professions Scholarship and will owe them four years as a navy doc in return for their paying for my medical education.... On an English/medicine note: I won the I 9th annual William Carlos Williams Poetry contest last year and was published in a magazine titled The Digest. The poem was supposed to be published in JAMA but that never came to fruition. I also got the chance to meet Dr. John Stone, with whom I have since formed a friendship. He has published 5 collections of poetry and a book called The Country of Hearts. He is a cardiologist at Emory and I have learned a great deal just by listening to him speak of Medicine and poetry... I am so happy that my life has taken this path. Medicine is not as I had envisioned it, much like any dream of youth, but it holds secrets that I did not know I could be privy to or even would want to be..."
