From its beginning in 1996, the Retired Physicians Section has been a force with excellent programs and unmatched fellowship. One morning, Bronia Merlin a survivor of Auschwitz, Freudenthal, and Ravensbruck, captivated attendees with an account of her experiences. During her talk, something unexplained and compelling happened. Mrs. Merlin and our executive director had never met, before, but during the talk, a powerful "connection" took place. When she finished speaking, Mrs. Merlin walked into the audience, took Bonnie Brown's face in her hands, and kissed her right cheek, with gusto. It seemed perfectly natural. A truly remarkable woman of strength and determination, Mrs. Merlin died in 2017 at the age of 96.
